Stormwater Services is spreading the word about illicit discharge:

Be on the lookout for messages from the Stormwater Services about illicit discharge on the City's Facebook page. The term illicit discharge sounds complicated, but is really not. It refers to anything that makes its way into the storm drainage system that isn't entirely composed of stormwater runoff. Our storm drains and drainage ditches are intended to collect rain, sleet, snow, or hail and transport the water straight into our creeks, streams and lakes without any treatment. Therefore pouring, disposing or dumping of any materials into our storm drains, catch basins, drainage ditches or straight into waterbodies is an illicit discharge.

Fire Department Re-Accreditation:

The Fire Department is finalizing preparations for our upcoming re-accreditation process. Our accreditation, which is awarded through the Commission on Fire Accreditation International, is granted for a five-year period and we were last re-accredited in 2017. All final documents for re-accreditation have to be submitted by the end of March and our site visit is currently scheduled for the week of May 22nd. There is an extensive amount of work involved in making the final preparations to get all necessary documents submitted and Fire Department members are fervently striving to make this happen. The Commission hearing, in which we would go before the Commission to be considered for re-accreditation, is anticipated for August. The date and location has not yet been announced.

Monroe Fire Department Summer Camp:

Firefighters are planning for our annual Monroe Fire Department Summer Camp. Camp 1872, named after Monroe Fire Department's initial organization date, is scheduled for June 14 – 17, 2022. The camp is for youth, ages 14 to 17, and is free. The camp will be held at Monroe's Fire Training Grounds and will allow campers to experience the fire service by participating in various fire service related and team building activities. There are 40 participant spaces available and registration opens in April.



Welcome Monroe Firefighter Recruits:

Monroe Fire Department welcomes six new firefighter recruits to our Fire Department family and to Recruit Class 21. These recruits include two existing City employees who have transferred from other City departments and four new employees. Chad Aldridge and Zack Ross have transferred from the Engineering Department; Caleb Baucom, Jamie Bergen, Elian Paniagua and Ethan Whitley are new hires. They will begin with a five-week Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certification program followed by a 14-week firefighter certification school. This is the 21st Monroe recruit class held since Monroe Fire Department was re-organized following the separation of Public Safety in 1999. 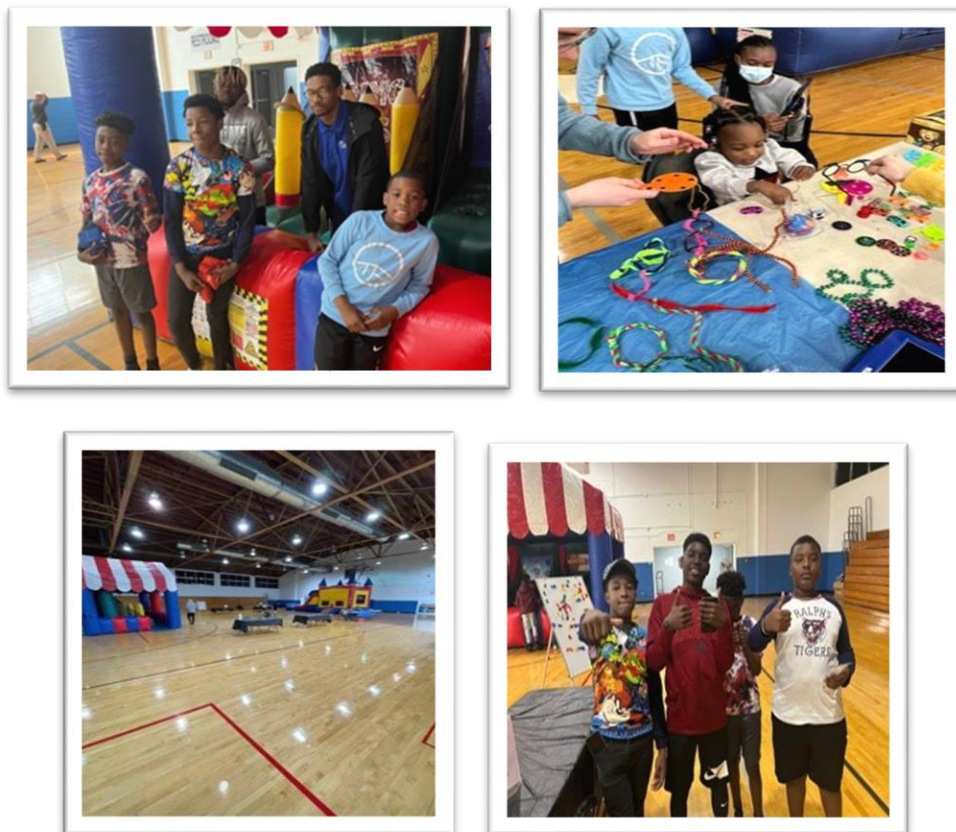

Water Resources

Water Resources Administrative Team Completes Data Conversion:

In 2020, the City's IT and Finance Departments were contemplating the difficult task of replacing the antiquated H.T.E. software. They notified all Departments that they would need to convert all merged historical utility records stored in Laserfische into Department specific storage locations as part of this software conversion. With over 20,000 water resources records in this system, Water Resources Administrative staff considered contracting out the task. Ultimately they decided they could tackle it to save money and blend it in with their existing work load.

Fast forward to today, the task has been completed, with 23,265 records converted. The new records configurations will increase efficiency when using historical address file information, and ensure compliance with record retention laws.

Special thanks to Amanda Horne, Administrative Assistant II, Sandra Slifer, Administrative Supervisor, and our dear departed Donna Brock, Administrative Assistant I, for their tireless effort in accomplishing this goal in time for the upcoming Munis conversion! This is an excellent example of how a can-do attitude and teamwork can get a difficult task done, while saving money for our utility customers.

NCDOT Hayne Street Paving Requires Water Main Relocation:

The NCDOT is paving 2.5 miles of NC 207 (S. Hayne St.) from W. Morrow Street to Stack Road to be completed by early summer of 2022. The Water Resources Engineering and Construction Divisions coordinated the design and relocation of an important city water main as part of the paving project. The construction involved moving the water main out of the paved area and included a difficult creek crossing. Pavement coordination is an important ongoing task for both City and NCDOT paving projects and any utility work.
