

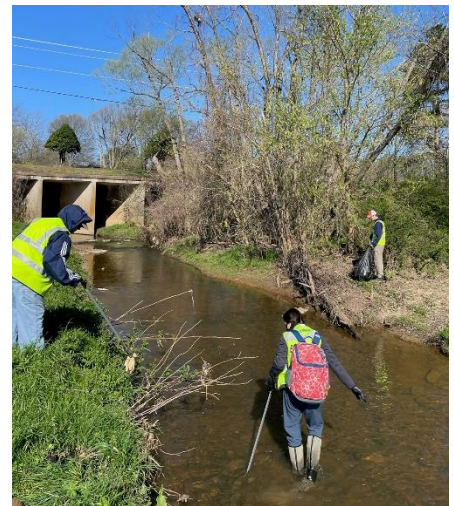

**Spring Creek Cleanup**

The Engineering Department collaborated with Union County Soil & Water Conservation District to hold a Spring Creek Cleanup at the Union County Farmers Market. ## Water Rescue Drill

The Water Rescue Team conducted a drill at Cane Creek Park April 28 - 30. Monroe Fire Department and Union County Emergency Management worked collaboratively to plan, prepare, and execute the drill; furthering the existing partnership and growing collectively in skills and preparedness. The drill included boat operations, land and water searches, and communications training. The drill intentionally put team members in realistic situations in order to prepare them for future search and rescue events. 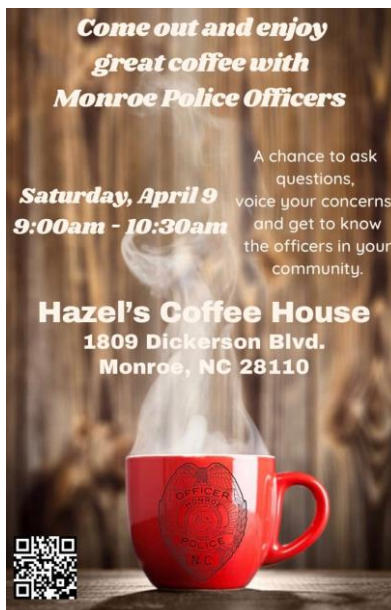
### **Community Involvement/Youth Engagement**

### **Water Main Replacement Begins on Cedar Street**

Water Resources Construction Division crews have initiated replacement of an aging 2-inch water main on Cedar street, from Miller to Wolfe. Approximately 500 feet of water main will be renewed, including services to five customers. This project is part of the ongoing asset management program for Water Resources, with a goal of replacing 1% of the system annually. The City currently has over 1.6 million feet of water main in the ground. Pictured below are Crew Leader II Casey Keziah (in the excavator) and Equipment Operator II Chris Deese measuring trench depth. The total project will take four weeks +/- to complete.



### **John Glenn Water Treatment Plant (WTP) Treatment Basin #1 Coating Project Complete**

The six-month effort to rehabilitate the protective coatings on the John Glenn WTP treatment basin #1 has been completed. The project was completed on-time and on budget at a cost of \$603,000. Shown below are before and after pictures, with Chief Operator Robbie Jenkins posing in the newly coated basin.
